 1. Added category in the instrument on SLOs and assessment
 2. Added columns to the prerequisite checking chart to keep track of how many course have SLOs, assessment plans, implementation of assessment plans, and review of data
 - B. Although the general consensus was that assessment was integrated smoothly into the program review instrument, concerns were expressed about the increased workload for faculty and staff to assess.

Do students about to transfer and become majors in the discipline you teach (or students about to complete your certificate program), feel they have achieved your program's learning outcomes?

- What do students think about the new grant-funded intervention that seems to work for some, but not all, remedial math students?
- What do employers think of your graduates and how do they think you can strengthen some of your major vocational programs?
- What do members of the business community, K-12 and other major stakeholder groups in your community think about your college?
- Which support services are most important to different student groups on your campus?

You can investigate these kinds of questions with a research tool too often overlooked: **FOCUS GROUPS**.

When designed and implemented carefully, focus groups can help researchers, faculty, program coordinators and planners deepen their understanding of how something works and how it can be improved. Learn to plan focus groups by attending a day-long training session. The morning session will provide participants with a basic understanding of when to use focus groups and with the nuts and bolts of how to plan and conduct one. During the afternoon session, participants will work in teams to practice how to plan and conduct a focus group.

SLO Assessment Plan Checklist

(to be revised and added to the Framework)

Assessment is an ongoing process aimed at understanding and improving student learning. It involves making our expectations explicit and public; setting appropriate criteria and high standards for learning quality; systematically gathering, analyzing, and interpreting evidence to determine how well performance matches those expectations and standards; and using the resulting information to document, explain and improve performance. (T. Angelo, 1995).
