Skyline receives federal stimulus funding from the San Mateo County Workforce Investment Board

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA, the Economic Stimulus Bill) is an effort to jumpstart the economy, and create or save jobs. Skyline College responded to a request from the San Mateo County Workforce Investment Board (WIB) to propose education opportunities in anticipation of ARRA funding. On June 18, the Workforce Investment Board voted to allocate ARRA funding for three instructional programs that Skyline proposed to help people get the education needed for jobs in this ever changing economy. Those programs include:

- Auto Service Technician Program: This 2.5 unit program will serve up to 23 students during the 2009- 2010 year.
- Emergency Medical Technician B Certificate Program: This 7 unit program will serve up to 25 students during the 2009-2010 year.
- Medical Coding and Billing Certificate Program: This 17 unit program will serve up to 25 students during the 2009-2010 year.

Vice President of Instruction Regina Stanback Stroud worked with Deans Margie Meadows and Mike Williamson, and William Watson, Director of Workforce Development, to create and submit a proposal for a group of programs designed to prepare people in manageable timeframes for desirable career opportunities. Funding for the entire project totals \$258,939.

Skyline College spring athletics wrap-up

Skyline College athletic teams and students enjoyed a successful finish to the sports season. 72 students participated in the spring semester in Women's Basketball, Men's Basketball, Baseball and Women's Badminton. Women's Basketball finished the season with an overall record of 24-7 finishing third in the Coast Conference North division and qualifying for the state playoffs a second year in a row. The Men's Basketball team finished their season with an overall record of 18-14 finishing third in the Coast Conference North division and qualified for the state playoffs for the first time since 2003. Our Baseball team completed the season 27-16 finishing second in the Coast Conference Pacific Division. In Women's Badminton, the team finished 6-2 overall which was good enough for second place in the Coast Conference. In singles and doubles competition, the top singles player and doubles team reached the state quarterfinals. Eighteen individuals received recognition as All-League, All-State and/or All American Selections. The individual are: Laura Zasly (Women's Basketball - 1st Team All-Conference and 2nd Team All-State), Katie Zasly (Women's Basketball – 1st Team All-Conference), Danielle Simon (Women's Basketball - Honorable Mention), Jennifer Matawaran (Women's Basketball - Honorable Mention), Sean Echols (Men's Basketball -2^{nd} Team All-Conference), Matt Fotchman (Men's Basketball – Honorable Mention – All Conference), Ronney Freeman (Men's Basketball – Honorable Mention – All Conference), Rodney Freeman (Men's Basketball – Honorable Mention – All Conference), Marcus Pointer (Baseball - Coast Conference Pacific Pitcher of the Year and All-American), Greg Gonzalez (Baseball – 1st Team All-Conference and All-American), Tony Loeffler

(Baseball – 1st Team All-Conference), Lucas Hagberg (Baseball – 2nd Team All-Conference), Taylor Heon (Baseball – 2nd Team All-Conference and Finalist Rawlings Gold Glove Award), Cody Larson (Baseball – 2nd Team All-Conference), Jesse Orozco (Baseball – 2nd Team All-Conference), Nico Vargas (Baseball – 2nd Team All-Conference), Nour Abudamous (Women's Badminton – All Conference Singles and Doubles), Rachelle Berania (Women's Badminton – All Conference Singles and Doubles). With the exception of one student, all these individuals attended high school in San Mateo or San Francisco County. Academically, Skyline's teams had a cumulative GPA of 3.09. Women's Basketball (3.45) and Baseball (3.13) both had team GPA's above a 3.0. The completion rate for all course attempted by student-athletes was 87% and 28 students achieved a 3.0 grade point average or higher while completing 12 or more units in the spring semester.

Skyline holds 1st Annual Summer Counselor Institute

Twenty Skyline Counselors participated in the 1st Annual Summer Counselor Institute sponsored by Skyline's College Success Initiative (CSI). The two-day agenda covered a broad variety of topics. Sessions were facilitated by both full-time and adjunct counselors. On June 4, topics included Review of CSI Student Services Initiatives, Using On Course Philosophies in Counseling/Career curriculum, Discussion on Case Management Implications, and Fulltime and adjunct counseling issues. A Career 410 Training Session was conducted in the afternoon for all counselors teaching the course. The program for June 5 included a variety of informational updates: Assessment Update-ESL, New Online Professional Development Program for Counselors, Early Alert Update, Student Success Program Update, Career Information, Mental Health Tips, Transfer Updates - Review of AP/IB and Counseling students with a Nursing major, and Planting Seeds – Budget Implications.
