1. Click on any of the hyperlinked documents on the webpage to access components of the self study draft. A .pdf document will open in a new window.
2. On each page of the document you will see a "submit comments" button. Click on those buttons to make comments.
3. Your email client will open with a reply email address and subject header already identified. Just be sure to identify the line numbers in the document so that the Steering Committee can readily understand your input.

If you prefer to work with a hard copy, printed copies of the self study will be available in division areas by Monday, March 5th for reference.

Skyline Shines Awards—Call for Nominations, due April 13

The deadline for nominations for this year's awards is fast approaching. The Skyline Shines Awards are given in recognition of individuals or groups who help Skyline to shine in terms of its quality of programs and services and its reputation for quality. Two awards are made annually: one to a member or group of the Skyline employees and one to a member or group from the community. The Call for Nominations for the Skyline Shines Awards has been sent out to all Skyline employees and has been disseminated to the community through both the president's council and via a press release. The awardees would be those who most help the college live up to the college's values, which are: campus climate, open access, academic excellence, community connection and shared governance. Update on plans for renovation of the central quad

In an earlier edition of *Skyline Shines* I mentioned that the redesign of our central quad (between Buildings 1 and 2 and between 7 and 8) would likely begin during the spring break and be completed over the summer. That timeline has changed now. Instead, the quad redesign will be undertaken as part of the whole Design Build Project which will take place over the next few years. There are several reasons for the change in timeline: the tightness of the original timeline, the need to maintain accessible paths of travel, and our interest in ensuring that the quad design fits in well with the other changes in the look and feel of the campus that will take place as part of the Design Build project. We are also hoping to include a water feature that is beautiful and that

is not overly burdensome or costly to operate and maintain. The change in timeline will help ensure that we get all of these issues addressed.

Study abroad program in China, June 2-16, 2007

This is something new that may be of interest to students that you know. Skyline College is offering a short-term, intensive learning experience in China this summer from June 2-16, 2007. Students will travel to China and experience first-hand the businesses, economy, language, and culture of China. BUS. 680SB (a 3 credit course) – Study Abroad in China is a two-week course which includes mandatory pre-departure and post trip meetings, lectures at the local universities, visits to Chinese businesses, culture tours, and an individual research paper. MESA program connects students with their futures

- **2007 Genentech Scholar:** MESA Student Selected MESA Student Amanda Quiroga was selected as this year's Genentech Scholar. Amanda, a Chemistry Major, will receive a \$7500 scholarship, a research mentor, and a summer position at the Biotechnology facility in South San Francisco.
- **Stanford MESA Day:** Friday, February 9, was the 2nd Annual Community College MESA Day. Our Skyline MESA Program was selected to oversee the project. Over 150 students from community college MESA Programs throughout the state were invited to Stanford and were given the red carpet treatment. Students toured labs not open to the general public and were given information about graduate and summer research programs in the sciences. In addition Stanford has committed to one slot for one eligible Skyline MESA Student to receive a research position at the Center for Polymer Interfaces and Macromolecular Assemblies this summer.
- **18 Guaranteed Research Positions slated for our Skyline MESA Students this Summer:** SFSU's Bridges to Baccalaureate Program, an NIH funded grant has committed to **18** slots for our MESA students majoring in such majors as Biology, Bio Chemistry, and Chemistry. 12 of our Skyline MESA Students will participate in Directed Research at SFSU. Students will participate in a six week program and receive a stipend of \$1800. During the first portion of the program students will participate in an academic success workshop conducted by Frederick Moore, Ph.D., and author of the book "Finding Your North:" <http://www.findingyournorth.com/index.htm> 6 students will participate in Independent Research and will receive a stipend of \$2400. Dr. Christine Case will be the research mentor for the independent research. Students from her Biology 230 course will be selected to engage in research and be given a stipend of \$2400. These students will then submit their abstracts to present at either SACNAS or ABRCMS. Tracy Bailey, MESA Student and President of Skyline's BSU was selected for the BA Star Program, a five week summer program at Chico State focusing on Physics.

Skyline students part of a national study of innovative bookstores and how they serve students

The National Association of College Stores (NACS) came to Skyline on February 15 as part of a comprehensive research project to provide insight into today's college students. NACS chose four universities/colleges that are known for the innovative work they are doing in merchandising, marketing and/or campus outreach. Students were recruited to participate in group interviews, in-store interviews and participation in a video. The results of the study will be presented at the NACS national convention in March and will be made available to the bookstore staff as well as Skyline's research office

5. **Institutional/degree level SLOs – review of draft:** Regina reported on the college wide discussion of the broad Student Learning Outcomes. They are designed to align with our new Vision and Mission statements. Comments should be directed to Karen Wong.
6. **District Shared Governance Committee update:** Carla Campillo reported on topics discussed including the district budget, accreditation, the district mission statement, possible faculty IDs and a district wide directory with photos.
7. **M.E.E.T. on Common Ground training: update:** Carla Campillo reported that the dates for the training have been set for March 22 and 29. (See above in *Skyline Shines* for the details.)
8. **Finalize recommended building names:** The Council approved the latest draft of the recommended building names and the list will now go to the Chancellor's Council for final action.
