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

Student Life Takes Part in Largest Global Action in History

On Thursday, February 14, 2013 The ASSC, Organizations & Club Council, and The Center for Student Life and Leadership Development, held a program that was a part of the largest global action in history to end violence against women and girls. Part of the International V-Day Campaign, 1BillionRising, students gathered together to fill the courtyard with homemade posters stating facts about violence against women and discussed why they stood in solidarity to bring awareness to the issue. Along with posters and facts, the group rose together to perform "Break the Chain," a dance choreographed by long-time professional Debbie Allen. Students, faculty, and staff that participated in the event brought awareness to the fact that violence against women and girls is intersectional—not just an ethnic, religious, or class issue. 1 in 3 women and girls will be beaten in their lifetime, and Skyline College decided to rise and take a stand about it. After the Break the Chain performance that happened around the world, students and staff shared heartfelt and heartbreaking stories revolving their personal experiences on the issue.



Throughout the rest of the day, student leaders from the Associated Students and Programming Board hosted a jeopardy game revolving around sexual health, provided resources from the Health Center on safe relationship practices, created a make your own Valentine station, had interactive safe relationship activities, and had a Valentine's themed photo-booth. The Heart to Heart program garnered over 580 participants at the event and through social media support.

The event galvanized new supporters, created more aware students, put Skyline College on the map through the VDay campaign, and even produced a strong enthusiasm to have more events similar to Heart to Heart in the college's programming calendar.




Business Speaker Series

SparkPoint at Skyline College hosted a successful Open House celebration on Monday, February 25, 2013 from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Approximately 300 people attended the event to learn about the Benefits Access for College Completion (BACC) project, visit our new facilities, enjoy food and live Latin jazz music, and listen to inspiring speeches from Skyline College's President, Dr. Regina Stanback Stroud, and United Way of the Bay Area's Senior Director of Educational Programs, Ed Center.

After the closing speech, SparkPoint held a celebratory ribbon cutting to commemorate the opening of the SparkPoint Center's newly renovated facilities. Two of SparkPoint's partner agencies, California Employment Development Department (EDD) and San Mateo Credit Union, shared information about their respective services to interested participants during the event and the <u>United Way of the Bay Area Regional SparkPoint Initiative</u> presented a poster board outlining SparkPoint efforts throughout the Bay Area to reduce poverty by 50% by the year 2020.

The Open House featured our partnership with the <u>Center for Law and Social Policy</u> and the <u>American Association of Community Colleges</u> to serve as one of six community colleges in the nation demonstrating how eligible students can access public benefits in addition to financial aid in order to improve college completion rates. SparkPoint and Financial Aid Office staff partnered to conduct four poster presentation sessions describing different aspects of the <u>Benefits Access for College Completion (BACC)</u> project. The first 100 students who attended these presentation sessions received a \$20 gift card to the campus bookstore and World

TRiO Students Meet the Challenge!

"Ropes course taught me to go as far as I could, then push for one step further and with my peers support I pushed all the way through." KR

A group of 15 TRiO students accepted the challenge to complete the Fort Miley Ropes Course on a beautiful clear day. The Ropes Course is a progression of challenging elements of physical, emotional and mental challenges that encourage team development. Built out of cables, ropes and climbing equipment in a grove of trees that is located on the edge of the Pacific Ocean at Land's End in San Francisco.

The day began with an introduction, students were asked to explore what they would like to accomplish at the end of the day. This was followed by a facilitated led stretching exercises designed to increase the group's comfort level with physical challenges, working in close proximity and direct communication. The next challenge was the trust sequence students learned the proper ways to "spot" a partner, and to "spot" as part of a group.

To begin the Ropes Course, the students had to devise a way to get the group from one platform (about one foot off the ground) to another platform located about 20 feet away using just two boards without touching the ground. The students then rotated through the following four challenges: "Double Trouble" requires two students to start at opposite ends and attempt to cross a 30-foot long cable strung between two trees that is about twenty feet off of the ground. "The Perch" expects a student to climb to the top of a 30 foot tree where s/he attempts to stand up on top of the tree and jump for a trapeze bar hanging about three feet away. The third challenge is "The Beam," the student climbs up to a wide beam that is inclined (about 35 feet up) and walks across its length (approximately 20 feet). The fourth challenge is the "Multi-Vine," the student climb a tree to a height of approximately 40 feet and walk across a cable, using long ropes suspended from a top wire. The participant starts with one rope, walks as far as the rope will allow him or her, then reaches for the next rope, continuing in this fashion until they reach the end. Upon returning to campus, the entire group gathered to share what they learned or reaffirmed about themselves and how they can apply their experience in the classroom and in life.



An Afternoon of Professional Development in Career Counseling

The Career Services Center hosted the first annual Career Conference with over 30 participating counseling faculty, staff, interns and students interested in gaining practical hands on experience in career counseling. Dr. John D. Krumboltz, psychologist, career specialist and author of *Luck is No Accident* including several books on *Cognitive Behavioral Therapy* illustrated the usage of his Happenstance Theory of Career Counseling. Counselors had the opportunity to practice the usage of the Happenstance theory and gain a deeper understanding of this practical technique used in career counseling. Special thanks to Nina Flora and to the Vice-President of Instruction, Sarah Perkins for the support of this tri-campus professional development event.





The Career Conversation Series: Business/Marketing Advertising and Sales

The Career Services Center highlighted speaker, Veneese Johnson, this past Wednesday February 27. She spoke to students regarding business branding and the importance of soft skill development for the workplace. Ms. Johnson gave examples of how perceptions in the workplace can limit or enhance your employment outlook and future promotions.

Veneese Johnson shared methods of enhancing the way others form perceptions of our professional persona by enhancing our work traits, dress and speech patterns. Participating students from Dr. Tony Jackson and Phyllis Taylor attended the motivational event.

Call for Submissions: Aming Kuwento II: The Next Chapter

In Fall 2004, several students from the Filipino Student Union and Kababayan Program met Evangeline "Vangie" Canonizado Buell, Filipina community activist and co-founder of the East Bay chapter of the Filipino American National Historical Society (FANHS), who reminded all of us of the significance of remembering and writing about our history:

"If we do not tell our own history, then others will tell it for us — as *they* interpret it — and we will risk losing the essence and truth about the Filipino American experience. That history could fade from memory, and one day, our children's children could be asking, 'Who were our ancestors? What were they like? What did they do?' and there could be no one to answer and nowhere to look."

Moved by these inspiring words, these students created *Aming Kuwento: Our Stories*, a collection of artwork, photography, poetry, short stories, and essays about the Filipino and Filipino American experience. Students, faculty, staff, and community members all contributed to the project, which was funded by a Trustees' Fund for Program Improvement awarded in Fall 2004.

This year, the Kababayan Program at Skyline College is celebrating its 10th anniversary, and to commemorate the event, with the help of the Literature 267: Filipino American Literature class, we are putting together *Aming Kuwento II: The Next Chapter*, another anthology about the Filipino and Filipino American experience, open to Filipinos and non-Filipinos at Skyline College alike.



Many of you submit material to be included in Skyline Shines. Thanks so much for taking to time to help me keep the college informed. Here are a few guidelines that will facilitate the publication of Skyline Shines each week:

Send submission to skylineshines@smccd.edu

- Submit your article by 3:00 p.m. on Thursdays; articles received after this time will appear in the following week's issue
- Place your submission in a Word document with your pictures pasted in the document.
- Use medium sized pictures that are equal to 1/4 or 1/2 of a page.
- Use Times New Roman 12pt. font that is justified to the left for the body of the article.
- Don't forget to add a headline/title using 18 pt. bold font that is justified to the center
- Use the following commonly accepted abbreviations: a.m. or p.m. (i.e. "The event will be held from 8:00 a.m. 1:30 p.m." "The workshop is scheduled to run from 9:30 a.m. Noon."
- Spell out numbers of one or two words. Use figures for numbers that require more than two words to spell out. (i.e., "Almost eight years ago I began taking ceramics courses." And "I counted 176 records on the shelf.").
- If a sentence begins with a number, spell out the number or rewrite the sentence.
- Use the month, day, a comma and the year to indicate the date (i.e., "March 4, 2011" not "March 4th, 2011 or March 2nd, 2011").
- Add the word College when you refer to the name Skyline (i.e., Skyline College instead of Skyline).
