Program Mission and Goals

The mission of the Paralegal Studies Program ("Program") is to empower and transform a global and diverse community of learners. Our goal is to provide equitable opportunities for students to envision and achieve their educational, intellectual, personal, and professional goals. The Program offers an A.A. degree and a Certificate in Paralegal Studies.

Three Strengths of the Program

First Strength:

Contributing to the Skyline College Promise. The Program helps students get in, through, and out, ontime. Since the last Comprehensive Program Review, we have collaborated with the Center for Workforce Development, the Career Advancement Academy, the Career Center, the Counseling division, and the International Student Program to establish multiple entry points for students into Skyline College. This includes but is not limited to outreach at Baden high school and participation in events such as "Meet Your Major," "Big Brothers, Big Sisters," and "CTE Day". Further, the Program offers a logical sequence of courses so students can meet their educational goals in as a few as two semesters while also offering students the flexibility to earn a degree on their own schedule. We offer introductory courses in the day and evening and offer many courses in hybrid format to allow students to attend school while working full-time and/or fulfilling family or other obligations. Further, we partner with SparkPoint, the Center for Workforce Development, and the President's Innovation Fund to help students secure financial aid, win Grove Scholarships, enroll in the Career Advancement Academy's free textbook loan program, and gain highly subsidized access to a costly fee based online legal research tool. These are just some examples of how the Program supports student success and actualizes Skyline College's values of: Social Justice, Campus Climate, Open Access, Student Success and Equity, and Academic Excellence.

Second Strength:

Innovation and Equity. The Program provides innovative and equitable learning opportunities for students to achieve success. As an example, in 2017 the Program dedicated hundreds of hours to completing the American Bar Association's Application for Approval of Paralegal Programs. While we face a high hurdle in this effort, if we win approval we will be the only community college between San Francisco and San Jose to attain this status. It is our hope that this will increase access by students into coveted legal support positions. As a second example, in the Community Legal Services Clinic, students earn college credit while providing free legal assistance. In so doing, students progress towards their educational goals, build their resumes, and learn legal skills while making a positive social impact with underserved members of the community. Third, at Legal Careers Night, students leverage Skyline College's connections to network with and learn from local legal hiring managers and attorneys. This

helps students grow social capital they otherwise might not have and connects learning in and out of the classroom. Fourth, in the capstone course, the Program partners with students to help them achieve their goals rather than imposing goals on them students. More specifically, the course provides the students opportunities for self directed learning and offers coaching in how to develop a professional portfolio, formulate a personal mission statement, and/or plan their next educational and professional steps. Fifth, the Program schedules many courses in a hybrid format where students have regular opportunities for in person instructor-student and student-student collaboration while also maintaining the flexibility students need to earn and learn beyond the classroom. Sixth, the program offers zero cost textbook in half of the courses required for the degree. Through these efforts and more, the Program puts into action Skyline College's values of: Social Justice, Campus Climate, Open Access, Student Success and Equity, Academic Excellence, and Community Connection.

Third Strength:

Campus Involvement. The Paralegal program is active and engaged on campus. Since the last Comprehensive Program Review, Program faculty have served as a member of the Design Team, as cochair for the Education Policy Committee, as a division representative on the Strategic Planning and Resource Allocation Committee, as faculty representative to the the Accreditation Oversight Committee, and as a member of the Academic Senate, the Advisory Committee for Employee Development, the Transfer Initiative Advisory Committee, and the Student Learning Outcomes and Assessment Committee. Program faculty have worked with Academic Support and Learning Technologies, the Center for Workforce Development, the Dream Center, the TRiO program, the Sparkpoint Center, and the Center for Transformative Teaching and Learning to provide professional development activities for faculty, educational opportunities for students beyond the paralegal program, and legal access for community members. Program Faculty have help Skyline College recruit and retain world class educators through active participation in six full-time faculty, administrator, and staff hiring committees; as a member of four faculty tenure committees; and as an observer of in person and distance education courses taught by part-time faculty. Finally, in this time, Program faculty have played an active role on the Advisory Committee for the Guardian Scholars Program and as Transfer Advocates. Through these efforts and more, the Program puts into action Skyline College's values of: Social Justice, Open Access, Student Success and Equity, Academic Excellence, and Participatory Governance.

Three Suggestions for Improvement

First Suggestion:

Enhance interdisciplinary learning opportunities focused on Skyline College's values. To date, Program faculty have focused on developing and revising courses, programs and learning activities within Paralegal Studies, Legal Studies, and Administration of Justice. To improve, we can work beyond our department to collaboratively develop interdisciplinary learning opportunities built on the values of social justice, student success and equity, academic excellence, and community connection. Examples include: a transfer degree in Social Justice; a Justice Studies program encompassing criminal justice, social justice, and paralegal studies; social justice themed courses and learning activities within courses; and community connections themed courses and learning activities within existing courses. Our work in developing the Community Legal Services Clinic course - where students earn college credit while learning to engage, listen, help people help themselves, and to self-reflect - will inform and guide these efforts.

Second Suggestion:

Data-based decision making. The Program should refine its process for the collection, reporting, analysis, and sharing of SLO assessment data among program faculty to better inform our decisions about course content, teaching methods, and professional development. Further, the Program would benefit from collecting more feedback from students, graduates, and local employers on the effectiveness of the Program. Methods could include surveys, additional Advisory Committee Meetings, and/or conducting student focus groups.

Third Suggestion:

Deeper Collaboration between full and part-time instructors. The Program is well aware that it can only fulfill its stated goals if all instructors are engaged in a continual process of self-improvement through mindful teaching and reflection. To achieve thi,, full and part-time instructors should meet on a regular basis to discuss and reflect on ways to better work with students in and out of the classroom. And, all instructors should participate in regular professional development to explore additional opportunities to offer innovative and equity minded learning experiences for students.

Additional Suggestion:

In addition, the Program hopes to collaborate with on campus partners to strengthen existing pathways to Skyline College and build new ones. While this project is beyond our scope to complete alone, we would welcome the opportunity to participate in an effort to develop a formal prison-to-school pipeline at Skyline College and /or to support formerly incarcerated students currently enrolled here. Further, we would welcome the opportunity to participate in strengthening Skyline College's connection with the San Mateo County Adult School, with local workforce development agencies such as Workforce Investment Boards (WIB) and the Employment Development Department (EDD), and.

Short Summary of Findings

The Program makes major contributions to Skyline College's values of Social Justice, Campus Climate, Open Access, Student Success and Equity, Academic Excellence, Community Connection, and Participatory Governance, as well as the Skyline College Promise to help students: "Get In, Get Out, and Get Through... On Time." We offer meaningful, relevant, and student centered educational opportunities with a focus on working with all students to achieve academic success, workforce readiness, transfer, and lifelong learning. Given the Program's relatively small size, the Program makes outsized contributions to Skyline College via: leadership in innovative programs, participatory governance, collaboration within Skyline College, and by helping Skyline College recruit and retain world class educators. With additional resources, we could explore ways to grow the program. But, whether we grow or remain relatively small and specialized, we will focus our efforts on providing innovative and equity focused instruction for all students we serve.

Success. The program's five-year aggregate success rate of 71.2% is marginally higher than Skyline College's rate of 70.4%. We can do better: in three of the five-years measured, the Program's success rate exceeded 73%. A look inside the numbers highlight some important trends. For groups traditionally underrepresented in higher education - African Americans, Peoples Indigenous to the Americas, and multiracial students – the program's success rates were 76%, 69%, and 74% respectively. In contrast, Skyline College's success rates over the same time period for the same groups were 56%, 63%, and 68% respectively. This suggests that the Program is making a positive impact for some traditionally underrepresented groups. As to hybrid courses, since the program redesigned its distance education courses in 2014-15, 119 of 178 students have successfully completed courses for a success rate of 66.8% which is significantly higher than the overall college rate for hybrid courses of 60.6 %. Retention. The program's five-year aggregate success rate of 83.4% is marginally lower than Skyline College's rate of 85%. One group of students that the program has been successful in promoting retention for is with African Americans where the Program's retention rate of 86% was higher than Skyline College's rate of 79% over the same time period for the same groups. However, the Program should be able to achieve similar rates for all students. As to Hybrid Courses, since the program redesigned its distance education courses in 2014-15, students have a retention rate of 79.2% which is marginally lower than the overall college rate of 80.6%. **Demographics**

The Program consistently serves women, non-white, and older students at higher rates than Skyline College as a whole.

One of the strengths of the Paralegal Program is the variety of courses we to offer to students despite our relatively small size. Namely: cross-listed courses with Administration of Justice; a dedicated Career Advancement Academy section; Community Legal Services Clinic, which provides innovative opportunities for paralegal students to learn while providing no cost legal services directly to our community; and Paralegal Internship wherein students build professional experience and earn college credit. While these courses do result in a relatively low load for the department, they also exemplify Skyline College's values of Social Justice, Campus Climate, Open Access, Student Success and Equity, Academic Excellence, and Community Connection. Thus, efficiency numbers do not accurately represent the Program's contributions to student success.

The Peninsula is home to approximately 910 legal employers, the overwhelming majority of whom are attorneys with a solo practice or a small firm. [1] According to the State of California Employment Development Department (EDD), most legal employers usually require an associate degree for a paralegal or a legal assistant position. [2] The State of California projects a 12 – 13 percent increase in paralegal jobs by 2024. [3] In 2016, the median annual salary of a paralegal working in the San Francisco Bay Area was \$74,684.00. [4]

The Paralegal Studies Program at Skyline College offers robust training and education to prepare students for legal work in San Mateo County and the greater Bay Area. In the last five years, the Program instituted the following actions to improve its effectiveness and tailor its training approach to the changing needs of local employers:

- 1. Hired a full-time faculty as lead instructor and faculty coordinator
- 2. Revised the Course Outline of Record and Syllabus for every course in the Catalog
- 3. Redesigned the Paralegal Internship
- 4. Launched Legal Careers Night
- 5. Formed and met annually with the Paralegal Studies Advisory Committee
- 6. Started the innovative Community Legal Clinic to serve the community and provide service learning opportunities
- 7. Successfully sought grant funding to provide highly subsidized Westlaw access for students
- 8. Eliminated outdated courses
- 9. Developed new and relevant courses including Law Office Technology and a capstone course

Importantly, we are engaging students and alumni in many of these efforts. For example, current and former students serve as members of the Advisory Committee, as presenters at the annual Legal Careers Night, as guest speakers in class, as resources for finding internship and job opportunities for students, and as sources of information regarding what we are doing well and what we can do to improve.

The legal profession continues to change as a result of technological advances, changes in the law, and the increasing demand for legal services by the increasing population. At the same time, legal education changes in response to developments in education and changing student populations. The Paralegal Studies Program instituted the initiatives detailed above to respond to the ever-changing landscape. To stay aware of new

developments and trends, we have development an organized evaluation plan to solicit input and feedback from current students, alumni, and local employers on the effectiveness, relevance, and quality of the program.

As part of these efforts, in 2017 the Program surveyed all forty-eight graduates from the past four years. The Program was able to contact thirty-three of the forty-eight graduates. Of the thirteen graduates whom we were unable to contact, two declined to participate in the survey, and the rest (11) had outdated contact information or did not respond to our voice messages. Thus, our response rate is sixty-nine percent (69%).

Of the thirty-three graduates who responded, thirteen are currently working as paralegals and four are currently working in the legal field in another capacity. Thus, seventeen of thirty-three or fifty-one percent (51%) of program graduates are working in the legal field, most as paralegals. Of the remaining, four were seeking employment, three were continuing in higher education, and eight were working in another field. As to the four seeking employment, the Program gave them contact information for legal recruiters who work closely with Skyline College and informed them of on-campus workshops for job seekers. Of those working in another field, six of eight reported that they were employed before enrolling and had enrolled for enrichment / skills building purposes and not to change jobs.

Program faculty and staff met in February 2017 to review and analyze the data. Discussion participants asked whether the 51% number was truly representative of students reaching their professional goals. The group then noted that, of the thirty-three graduates surveyed, only thirty were eligible for employment since three were currently in school. Of those thirty, eight were working in another field. As noted above, of those eight, only two expressed interest in becoming paralegals, leaving twenty-four students as the population of persons potentially seeking legal employment. Per the survey results, seventeen of those twenty-four, or 70%, are working in the legal field. Thus, while there there is certainly room for improvement, depending on your interpretation of the numbers, between fifty-one and seventy percent of graduates are achieving their goals.

All courses in the curriculum are offered a minimum of once each academic year. The Program has been an evening program only and core courses were offered only in the evening. In Fall 2014, we began expanding by offering LEGL 240 in the Fall and LEGL 245 and LEGL 290 in the Spring, both during the day. The pattern of curriculum offerings is as follows: Fall: LEGL 240, LEGL 245, LEGL 250, LEGL 252, LEGL 290, and LEGL 671. Spring: LEGL 240, LEGL 245, LEGL 247, LEGL 275, LEGL 290, LEGL 354, LEGL 430, and LEGL 671.

The Program's goal is to eventually offer all courses to day as well as evening students. The main issue is ensuring capacity for scheduling additional course offerings and maintaining instructional quality. Offering all required courses during the day and the evening would increase student access to LEGL courses and likely increase enrollment in the Program. Yet, offering day and evening sections is not possible given current staffing levels. Thus, the questions are: how can the Program accomplish its goal of increased enrollment such that an increase in staffing is feasible and desirable without decreasing the quality of educational opportunities currently provided and without decreasing its contributions to Skyline College beyond the paralegal classroom?

- 5. Grow the Legal Clinic's capacity to serve students via partnerships with SparkPoint and the Dream Center and by continuing to increase our community connection through outreach to local community organizations.
- 6. Increase Skyline College's role in addressing the access to justice gap by increasing awareness among students of their role in addressing legal inequities through classroom instruction, on campus events, and service learning.
- 7. Build connections among students, alumni, and local employers and the Program through networking, Legal Careers Night, in-class presentations, collaboration with local professional organizations.
- 8. Strengthen the legal internship program through engagement with local legal employers.
- 9. Survey current students, alumni and employers to develop a better understanding of our strengths and challenges.
- 10. Strengthen connections between the program and our community through engagement and outreach.
- 11. Engage with participatory governance and innovation at Skyline College through the Design Team, committee membership, membership in Academic Senate, and participation in faculty-led efforts to increase student success.
- 12. Engage with and empower students from underserved populations to increase access to education so our global and diverse community of learners can achieve intellectual, cultural, social, economic and personal fulfillment.

 release time can the Program Coordinator continue current efforts, teach courses and work on the

If the application is denied, significant additional hours will be necessary to address the ABA's concerns and submit the application. Second, the Program seeks to increase the commitment to program assessment by annually surveying current students, alumni, and local employers. Additional hours will be needed to draft, administer, assess, and report on the surveys. Third, the Program seeks to increase its inreach and outreach efforts. Since the last Comprehensive Program Review Cycle, the Program Coordinator has staffed events such as Career Technical Education Day, Meet Your Major, Big Brothers / Big Sisters, and others. Further, the Program Coordinator has spoken at local high schools and met with student organizations on campus including but not limited to TRiO, Rise Up, and the Gay Straight Alliance, with the goal of increasing enrollment at Skyline College and in the paralegal program specifically. A Program Services Coordinator is needed to take on these events and expand them to include outreach to the Adult School and the San Mateo County NOVA Workforce Board.
- 3. Non-Instructional Faculty. Paid hours for attorney/faculty member who can grow the capacity of the Dream Center and the Community Legal Services Clinic to serve undocumented students and to address the access to justice gap present among the students, staff and faculty of Skyline College and in our community. This is directly in accord with the Skyline College values of Social Justice, Open Access, and Community Connection.

Equipment

Westlaw access for thirty students. Skyline College subsidizes the high cost of this fee-based legal research service for students. Note, this is currently being funded by a generous PIF grant. When the PIF runs out, Skyline College should institutionalize this initiative to continue to provide students in the Program the opportunity to develop information literacy necessary to twenty-first century legal careers.

the time the data is requested. Generally, the figures are the decimal fraction of the teaching hours or units ascribed to the faculty member for teaching work done. Non-teaching time is specifically excluded so that it does not affect the value of the data. Work done by non-certified-personnel is

not included.

LOAD: Teaching Load is taken as the ratio of WSCH to FTE

N GRADES: The total number of grades awarded (A+B+C+D+F+CR+NCR+I+W)

RETENTION: The sum of all non-W grades divided by N grades times 100, expressed as %

SUCCESS: A+B+C+CR grades divided by N grades times 100, expressed as %
