



Students split up into groups and attended focus group meetings highlighting some of Skyline's programs: Accounting – hosted by Marv Steinberg; Early Childhood Education – hosted by Kathryn Browne; Automotive Technology – hosted by Julia Johnson; Computer Applications & Office Technology – hosted by Sita Motipara and Christine Roumbanis; and Medical Assisting and Medical Billing and Coding – hosted by Bernadette Newland. After the individualized tours and focus group workshops, all participants were treated to pizza.

BIOBus tour brings local high school students to Skyline

BUDGET UPDATE

Budget group meets weekly to discuss budget strategies

Skyline's College Budget Committee (CBC) has been meeting on a weekly basis and at its most recent meeting, the group considered budget suggestions which have been submitted to the college through its Budget eSuggestion box. The CBC took action on expense reduction strategies for the current year which will be implemented immediately. These approaches will allow the college to weather up to a 5% reduction in state revenue. If the current year cut goes deeper, more drastic measures would be required. Finally, the group examined an initial revenue projection for next year's budget which reflects the college's excellent growth and a resulting mitigation of the cuts the college will have to take. Nonetheless, there will still be serious expense reductions required for the 2009-10 year. The retirement incentives being considered by the Board could help and the CBC will also be considering other service reductions later this month.

RESEARCH AND PLANNING

Transfer Study highlighting Skyline is published

The state's Research and Planning Group/Center for Student Success for the community colleges has released a study entitled "A Qualitative Study of Two-to-Four-Year Transfer Practices in California Community Colleges." The study provides an analysis of seven case studies, one of them focused on Skyline, for colleges with consistently higher than expected transfer rates. Each case study is based on a site visit conducted in spring 2008 by Center for Student Success researchers to document and investigate the full spectrum of factors, inventions, strategies and practices that each college is implementing to support transfer. The full Skyline report is available at http://www.smccd.edu/accounts/skypro/student_learning_outcomes/student_outcomes.htm, as is a crosscase analysis of all seven colleges. This is a significant recognition for the college.

Voting December 5-17 on proposed inscriptions for new Building 4

The college is ready for voting by faculty, staff and students and the community concerning proposed inscriptions for the new Building 4. Construction on the new building will begin in the winter of 2009, with completion about two years later. The building will house the college's new Multicultural Center, the Cosmetology program, the administrative offices and many new classrooms. The inscriptions being considered are drawn from a list of dozens of proposals submitted this fall and then culled by the College Council to the eight below. They are listed alphabetically by author.
