
A beautiful mural is going up outside the Gallery Theater

The mural is part of a President's Innovation Fund project developed by Paul Bridenbaugh, Skyline's Gallery Theater Coordinator, to visually enhance the Gallery Theatre entrance, signage and website. The aim of the project is to increase the role of the Gallery Theatre on campus and in the community as a cultural center and arts venue. The mural depicts fabric panels from the parts of the world from which our students come, based on data provided to Paul by Rob Johnstone, Dean of Planning, Research and Institutional Effectiveness. From left to right, here is where the fabric panels come from: Japan, China, USA-Europe (New York, c. 1850 quilt), Indonesia (Bali), Africa (Nigeria), Middle East/Islamic (Turkey), Philippines (Southern, Mindanao), Mexico (Puebla), and Peru (South America c. 1600). 

PLANNING

Update on Skyline's construction plans

The latest edition of President Morrow's periodic construction updates has been posted on Skyline's web site. This version of the briefing is updated since the October 2008 edition. The title has been changed to include projects outside of the Design Build project scope and to reflect recent changes in the fiscal resources available to the district. It is entitled *Skyline College Capital Improvement Project Briefing* and it is located with the prior editions at http://www.skylinecollege.edu/facstaff/PresidentsOffice/.

Here is a synopsis: A number of challenges are confronting the college this spring related to funding available for our projects:

- The state's decision to delay the facilities bond initiative originally slated for the November 2008 ballot and to start over with the ranking of projects means that the district lost approval for funding, and the funding source, for some projects that had been planned. At Skyline this affected our plans for Building 2 (third floor) and for Building 1 (the Theater renovation).
- The general fiscal crisis which led to the Lehman Brothers collapse affected the district because about \$21 million of the bond money was invested (as required by law) in the county treasury, and it, in turn, was invested in Lehman Brothers.
- There are always unforeseen challenges which arise in the course of construction (such as structural issues, soil and water management issues), and some of those have affected the resources available too.

As a result, the college must establish sequencing priorities among the many important projects on the table, as well as continue to seek state resources for projects that match their funding criteria. That work is underway. The projects for which Skyline needs funding and for which there are extremely limited resources are these:

- Building 1 Theater renovation
- Building 1 renovation of floors 1, 2 and 3
- Building 2 floor 3 modernization: expansion of Student Services One Stop and other services (state funding was requested but the request was not successful)
- Building 5 renovation
- Loma Chica renovation to accommodate the Child Development Center
- Demolition of Pacific Heights (once we have finished using it for swing space) to allow for more parking space

The college is working with the budget right now to attempt to identify what should be done most urgently and what will need to wait. There are also other projects for which the college is making funding proposals to the state, including the two Building 1 projects above, the building 5 project, the Fitness Center project (which was deleted from Skyline's Design Build project), demolition of Pacific Heights (deleted from the Design Build project), and a Workforce and Economic Development Prosperity Center (much of which was in a building originally slated for the Design Build project). Meanwhile, the Building 4N and 11N projects are funded and are proceeding on schedule.

Skyline holds an emergency preparedness exercise

On February 24-25, several members of Skyline College participated in a Table Top and Functional Emergency Operations Center (EOC) Exercise. The scenario was a major earthquake which collapses a campus building and creates a hazmat situation in a chemistry lab. In this scenario there were a number of casualties which did facilitate full activation of the EOC (Emergency Operations Center) and provided a number of tasks that were managed by the Crisis Action Team and EOC Emergency Response Team. The scenario was realistic and facilitated excellent training. Classroom instruction was completed on February 24. All Emergency Response Team members (Crisis Action Team and EOC Emergency Response Team) attended this training. This training covered Emergency Operations using the National Incident Management System (NIMS) / Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS - 2 hrs) and EOC Documentation and Procedures (2 hrs). On February 25, the group completed the 1.5 hr Table Top Exercise from 1:00 PM to 2:30 p.m. with the members of the Crisis Action Team. At 2:30 p.m. they activated the Functional EOC Exercise for all members of the Crisis Action Team, EOC Emergency Response Team and the Simulation Team. The training was a success and will be followed by further training for other members of the college. Here is a peek into what went on.







Skyline's Technology Plan adopted by the College Council

Skyline College now has a comprehensive five-year technology plan toward developing an integrated state-of-the-art information technology environment. The plan strives not only to support student success and enhance instructional and administrative technology, but to improve communication, help maintain a safe environment and enhance teaching and learning opportunities both at the college and beyond. The plan has a rich underlying philosophy of accessibility, "high tech" and "high touch" while taking great care that the technology serves, not drives the college in its Mission, Vision, Goals and Strategies. All constituent groups played active roles in creating and shaping the plan. Multiple presentations to the Academic Senate, Classified Senate, Associate Students, Instructional Leadership Team, Managers Council and College Council were made, gathering and incorporating feedback to create the comprehensive plan. eSuggestion Box update—the results of faculty, staff and student suggestions

Skyline's faculty, staff and student have been submitting suggestions via the college's general eSuggestion Box at http://www.skylinecollege.edu/general/surveys/index.html. President Morrow reviews them consistently with her Cabinet and they determine how best to address the concerns raised. Periodically she provides a synopsis of the suggestions received and what has been done in response to them. Here are items that received during last summer and fall and the action taken:




- Paint the buildings a warmer color: this is being working on, beginning with new Building 4.
- **Increase evening course offerings:** the Office of Instruction is reviewing the class schedule with this in mind.
- **Provide a bike rack:** this is being worked on as part of the site improvements slated to take place over the next year.
- **Courtesy matters:** several comments either praised the courtesy of staff members or mentioned disappointment with treatment by faculty or staff, so it is a reminder on how important interactions with students, the public and each other are.
- Create a bus system to link the three colleges: this will be investigated.
- **Print a hard copy directory for the college**: this was done last fall and emailed to all staff. It is being updated now to reflect recent staffing changes and it will be posted on the Faculty and Staff Web site at http://www.skylinecollege.edu/facstaff/fachome.html.
- Department office hours on the website and outgoing voice mail: this suggestion will be discussed in the next Management Council meeting.
- Speeding in the parking lots: the methods for deterring speeding vehicles are the posted speed limit signs, speed bumps, and the presence of Skyline Public Safety Officers. In collaboration with the San Bruno Police Department, speed trailers are strategically located on campus for brief periods of time during peak periods. Skyline Public Safety Officers are not allowed to make traffic stops on speeding vehicles, though they can discuss speeding with offenders and if the driver is a student, make a referral for student discipline. San Bruno Police Department enforces the roadways around Skyline Boulevard and College Drive. Pacifica Police Department enforces the roadways near the Sharp Park entrance.
- **Specialized courses:** the college will not be able to help with a suggestion for the college to add coursework at the upper division (junior and senior) level due to the college's current transfer agreements and accreditation.
- Provide more recycling containers: Facilities staff are always looking for ways of promoting recycling efforts on campus. In October, they ordered and deployed 30 recycle containers to be placed near hallway and common area trash containers. These were in addition to those already placed in hallways. Also, they deployed 50 recycle containers in offices and office areas with the goal of making sure 100% of offices throughout campus have a recycle container readily available. New garbage and recycle "stations" are planned to be deployed throughout campus in all hallways and common areas. In May, Building 7 will be the first to see 15 of these prototype

- garbage and recycling "stations." Pending funding approval, more "stations" will start to appear in all campus buildings.
- Put trash cans next to the door in restrooms: Facilities staff recognized this paper towel littering at restroom entrances/exits as a problem throughout campus. In October they ordered and deployed 50 trash cans specifically for restroom entrance/exit areas. They continue to monitor the situation and hope paper towels end up in the containers and not on the floor.
- Heat and lights on a Sunday: Skyline's building lighting and heating systems are controlled by a computerized management system. Lighting and heating are scheduled to be "off" on Sundays. On the particular Sunday in question, Facilities crews may have been in Building 8 cleaning and waxing the floors. They coordinate and schedule the lighting and heating system to be "on" during those periods.
- Need for a hand rail on the new ramp between Buildings 5 and 6: This issue has been referred to Facilities and is being investigated.
- Sprinklers on in the quad during the day: The construction of the new Buildings 6 and 7 resulted in the destruction of all underground sprinkler lines in the main quad area. In an effort to keep the small areas of lawn thriving, it was necessary to run hoses and some spill-off onto pavement areas may have resulted. Grounds crews will not be watering the small lawn areas in the quad this Spring/Summer season because those areas will all be under construction for landscape site improvements. All irrigation for other grass areas throughout campus is controlled by timers and only occurs two times a week during the darkness hours between 3 to 5 a.m.
- **Provide hand sanitizers throughout the campus:** this idea will be explored.
- Fundraising suggestions: these have been referred to the Director of Development at Skyline.


President's Breakfast, March 26, 2009
