Skyline students shine at SACNAS once again

At the Society for the Advancement of Native Americans and Chicanos in Science (SACNAS) Convention on October 9-12, 13 Skyline students presented their original scientific research alongside students from University of Texas, Princeton University, Yale University, University of California, University of Vermont, and many other universities. There were 590 student presentations. Skyline's students started their research in Chris Case's Biology 230 class last spring and continued with Chris through the summer in Biology 690. Tiffany Reardon worked with the students to register and prepare them for presenting at a national conference. Chris and Tiffany reported that the students were knowledgeable and professional, and represented Skyline College well.

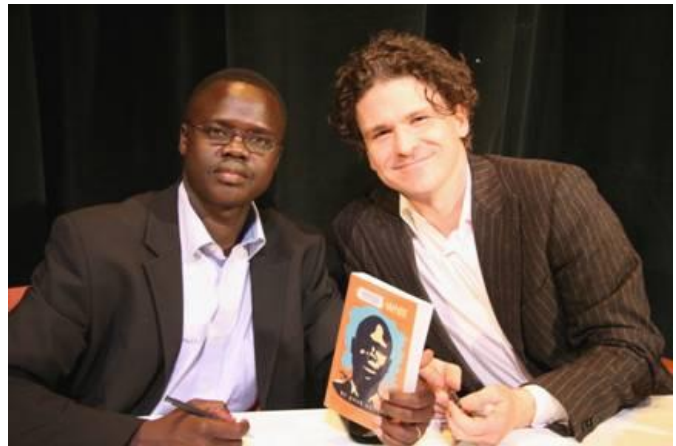
“What Is The What” events at Skyline



Genentech Scholars opportunity available to science students

The goal of the Genentech Scholars Program is to provide an opportunity for diverse students to gain access to Genentech and the biotech industry. On October 13, a recruitment presentation was held at Skyline. The program is offered to select schools in the Bay Area and is comprised of three components: financial assistance, an internship, and possible job placement. This successful program has aided a number of Skyline's students in their educational goals and further exposed them to the field of biotechnology. Genentech is looking for diverse students from Skyline who have demonstrated academic performance, leadership, community service, career aspirations in the field of biotechnology, and who meet certain eligibility requirements. Eligible students from Skyline College have the opportunity to apply to be a 2009 Genentech Scholar and receive a scholarship in the amount of \$7,500. The application deadline is December 1, 2008. A committee of Genentech employees will review all completed applications and select finalists.

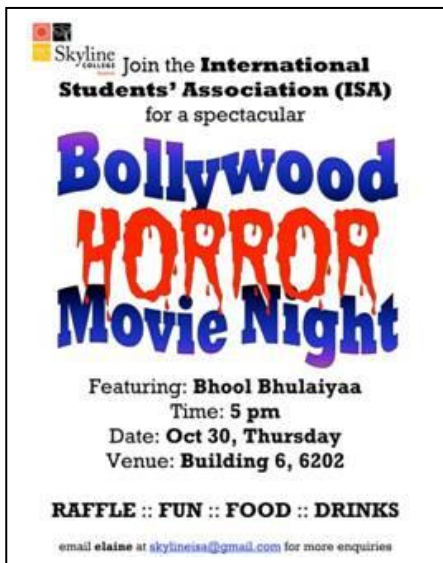
