

2018-19 Philosophy Annual Program Plan

I.A. Program Profile: Purpose

Describe the program(s) to be reviewed. What is the purpose of the program and how does it contribute to the mission of Skyline College?

Narrative

Philosophy is a truth-seeking tradition that explores the most fundamental questions one can ask about *reality, knowledge, and values*. To have a philosophy is to have reasoned positions on these questions. The Philosophy program offers a range of courses that cover topics in epistemology, metaphysics, the history of ideas, religious studies (including comparative world religions and philosophy of religion) ethics, political theory, critical thinking (including scientific methods), and symbolic logic (including the predicate calculus, the rules of probability, and applications of Bayes' theorem). The program incorporates a range of historical and cultural perspectives, ancient and modern, Western and Asian. Our approach in the curriculum is to draw connections to other disciplines, such as history, psychology, physics, biology, mathematics, and the arts. We are committed to the view that all ideas are subject to examination and criticism in a spirit of academic freedom and civility.

The philosophy program contributes to the College mission to "empower and transform a global community of learners" by offering a curriculum that helps students to become more aware of their shared humanity, their individuality, their social communities, and the contexts in which these are situated. Philosophy students explore the ideas of great thinkers from a variety of traditions and movements. The Program educates Skyline students in the methods and techniques of rigorous thinking about a wide range of fundamental questions regarding knowledge and the justification of belief, the nature of reality (ontology and cosmology), and values (moral and political). In particular, the subject of Critical Thinking has always been central to the discipline of Philosophy—our program offers the best venue for students to develop the ability assess or justify a claim on the basis of evidence. The program also provides members of our community with opportunities for personal enrichment. It helps to instill the intellectual virtues that are requisite for participating in a civilized and democratic society.

We are a single person department with two adjunct faculty members: Prof. Anton Zoughbie and

Prof. Jeff Diamond (who teaches a cross-listed course PLSC/PHIL 280: Political Philosophy).

Narrative

The Philosophy program did not hire an additional adjunct faculty member to teach Asian Philosophy. Instead, this highly specialized course has been banked due to past low enrollment and cancelation. We hope to reinstate the course in a couple of years if the district/college enrollment numbers improve.



II.B. Analysis: Program Environment

Narrative

The most significant internal change is the introduction of the Philosophy AA-T degree. To streamline our offerings, we have banked a course (Asian Philosophy) and dropped a course (History of Modern Philosophy) due to low enrollments and past cancelations. We expect to revisit the schedule of course offerings next semester to make sure that prospective PHIL majors have the opportunity to take the courses they need for the major. A few students have already declared an intention to major in Philosophy.

An external change that has affected the program is the shift in the Honors Transfer Program from dedicated courses to a system of courses by "contract." In the past, the Philosophy Program offered one course for the HTP (usually Ethics). Last semester, three students successfully completed honors contracts in Phil courses.

Narrative

Five courses were assessed Spring 2018 and Fall 2018: PHIL 160 (History of Ancient Philosophy), PHIL 312 (Philosophy of Religion), PHIL 100 (Introduction to Philosophy), PHIL 103 (Critical Thinking), and PHIL 240 (Introduction to Ethics). We learned from the results that the Philosophy program is doing well: all five assessments met the target of 2.0 (or 70%).

Narrative

All five SLO results show that the criteria were met.

We have recently made changes to the selection of texts, curriculum content, and assignments in two of our core course: PHIL 100 (Introduction to Philosophy) and PHIL 240 (Introduction to Ethics). We have also shifted our online PHIL 103 course (Critical Thinking) from the hybrid format to the fully online format.

We will track assessments for these courses over the next few semesters to try to determine if these changes make any significant difference.
